■ Salvatore Scarpitta, artist, 88. Born in Brooklyn and educated at the Academy of Fine Arts in Rome, Scarpitta joined the United States Navy during World War II and helped recover art stolen by the Nazis. After the war he worked as an artist in Rome, then moved back to New York in 1958. A race-car owner and driver, he was best known for his sculptures of cars and sleds, often made with found materials.
